

- Numbers and quality both declined with 5734 head penned this week at Roma.
- Cattle were penned from Mt Isa in the north, the central west, Warrego and the Maranoa.
- Steers under 280kgs sold to 428c, most from 350-380c with quality very mixed.
- Steers 280-400kgs were firm to reach 424c, the bulk from 340-380c.
- Steers 400-550kgs struggled to be 10c cheaper topping at 374c and averaging 319c.
- Heifers under 280kgs were firm to dearer, selling to 376c and ranging from 320-368c.
- Heifers 280-450kgs topped at 366c though most sold from 270-316c.
- Cows to the processors topped at 276c the bulk of the heavy 4 score cows selling from 240-271c.
- Medium weight and the 3 score cows sold from 220-255c to be firm.
- Lightweight boner cows and store cows sold from 160-221c.
- Cows and calves were mixed in quality though sold to \$2040 per unit.

THE WEEK AHEAD

Rumour, innuendo and a lack of clear direction is making all players in the beef market uncertain at present. Feeder cattle have come under pressure with the major players in the grainfed processing sector slowing up the supply chain. This is leading to a backlog of market ready cattle. The other problem is without high-end food sector demand both here and overseas certain cuts are also being discounted to shift product. Airfreight has also become much dearer; this has been of particular concern to lamb exporters. On the positive side, the numbers of cattle on offer look to be on the decline. This will help, as I believe the great season across the bulk of the eastern seaboard will keep grass operators in the market. In Roma over the past fortnight we've seen grass operators back competing on steers above 320kgs; a sight rarely seen over the past few years. The south Pacific peso continues to struggle and this continues to help exporters. Retail demand in Australia has also lifted with mince being stockpiled (not just loo paper). Beef in the US is being moved in great volumes, though again demand has moved from the top 4 cuts to the lesser cuts and product. Forget the US futures market it bears no resemblance to the cash market!
